On behalf of all members of the Texas Association of Law Enforcement Polygraph Investigators (TALEPI), I would like to formally OPPOSE the Sunset recommendations to deregulate polygraph in Texas. All members of TALEPI voted during our annual training conference in June 2020 to oppose the recommendations of the Sunset commission.
