The Holocaust and genocide against innocent people must be known by our citizens of our state — the atrocities, brutality, and savagery committed against them — for no reason at all.

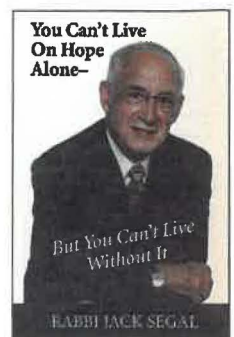
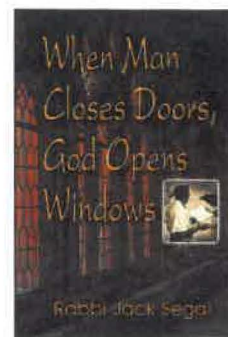
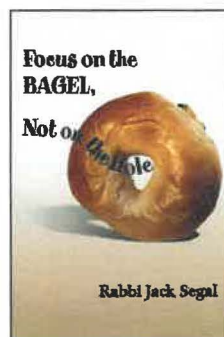
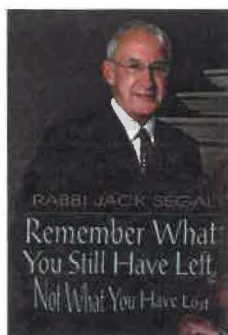
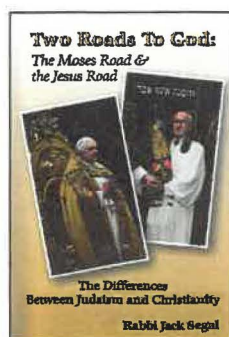
A recent study indicated that so many of our students could not even name one concentration camp constructed by the Nazis to exterminate Jews. It was

unbelievable to them that 6,000,000 Jews had been murdered in cold blood by the Nazis. The reason for this is because they had never heard about this previously. But this is one of the major purposes of the Texas Sunset Commission. By its activities these atrocities will not happen again because the Holocaust & Genocide Commission will continue its activities.

The Commission helps disseminate this information amongst our Texas teachers and students. It is a true "eye-opener" for them. The Commission also enables teachers and students to see exhibits about the Holocaust which makes these events "realistic" for the students and teachers thereby preventing its repetition in the future.

The Commission also does research in regard to the Holocaust. It has interviewed many American soldiers who fought during WWII and liberated some of the Nazis death camps — and many of these soldiers were from Texas. They told how they could not believe what their eyes saw, but after seeing these camps and the handful of survivors they could not deny what their eyes were seeing.
