I would like to extend my appreciation to you and your staff for contacting me during the Sunset review of the Texas Workforce Investment Council (Council). Sunset staff interviewed me in relation to the charge of the Council to both staff and provide administrative support to the Texas Skill Standards Board (TSSB). I have been a Governor-appointed member of the TSSB since 1996. I was appointed as chair in March 2003, following the retirement of our long-serving chairwoman Billie Pickard. During Chair Pickard's tenure, the TSSB was instrumental in establishing both the policies and processes required to build a voluntary skill standards system in Texas through the development and recognition of occupational skill standards. She also was key to finding the resources, through agreement with Pam Willeford, the then Chairwoman of the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, for Texas two-year colleges to develop programs that are responsive to the needs of employers by integrating skill standards into their technical programs and receive recognition from the TSSB.

For the past several years, the TSSB has met only twice a year. This is largely due to the fact that, with TSSB policies and procedures in place to guide skill standards development and program recognition, the role of the TSSB has changed to focus more on maintaining and promoting the skill standards system, while adjusting processes as necessary and fine-tuning policies where required. The TSSB delegated to the Chair the approval of applications by community and technical colleges to have their technical programs recognized. This delegation was critical to ensure that there was no delay in a college's ability to advertise and implement their program in the event that the TSSB did not have a meeting scheduled during that calendar year quarter. Much of the staff's work is focused on review and recommendation for approval of programs that have integrated skill standards into the curriculum; thus, much of the work now is administrative in nature.

Based on my time as a member and chair of TSSB and my understanding of the evolution of the TSSB's work, I agree with the recommendation in the Sunset Advisory Commission Staff Report to eliminate the TSSB and have the Council assume its four core statutory functions.
